

As you are aware, the Solid Waste Management Act of 1991 requires the Solid Waste Regions to plan, monitor, and report on solid waste activities. One of the requirements of this legislation was for each region to prepare a Ten-year Solid Waste Management Plan. The legislation also requires that Five-year updates to those plans be prepared and submitted to the state for review. The Greene County Region's Ten-year plan was approved on March 22, 1996; therefore, your Five-year Update is due to this office by March 22, 2001. Please note that the Update is expected to consider the next 10-year planning horizon, and will become your current Ten-Year Plan upon approval by this office.

Also required by the Solid Waste Act is submittal of a Needs Assessment report for all of the counties within each Development District. The initial Assessment was due by September 30, 1992; with revisions due by April 1, 1999 and every five years after that. 


Chapter 1: Summary


Formed in 1993, the Greeneville/Greene County Solid Waste Planning Region had been overseen for a number of years prior to its formation. The Greeneville/Greene County Solid Waste Board met regularly to oversee the operations of the Greeneville/Greene County Landfill which is now the Greeneville/Greene County Transfer Station and Class IV landfill.

The Region has 4 municipalities two of which provide door-to-door collection services and recycling services for residents. Tusculum has a door-to-door recycling collection program and Greeneville has a drop-off collection program. 15 staffed convenience centers provide solid waste, recycling, and special waste collection services the remaining residents in the County. A number of private haulers also provide door-to-door collection for citizens on a subscription basis.

In 2000, the Region disposed of 17,284 tons in two Class IV facilities. The Greeneville/Greene County landfill and the Adams Demolition Landfill, a privately owned Class IV landfill. 3,303.29 tons of recyclables were collected throughout the County and processed, while the Region is responsible for diverting 1,616 tons of yard waste in a mulching program at the transfer station. All of the Region's waste reduction programs were responsible for removing 22,203.29 tons of waste from local Class I landfills. Special wastes are collected at each of the County's convenience centers as well a number of private businesses. The Region is enrolled in option #3 of the State Tire Recycling Program and transports all waste tires to Johnson City for recycling.

The main focus of the Region's efforts to reduce waste disposed of in landfills continues to be Class IV diversion and has proved to be extremely successful over the years. This option has made industrial waste reduction programs a success in the County as well.

The Greene County Regional Solid Waste Planning Board meets on a regular basis to discuss solid waste related issues on-going in Greene County. The Board is responsible for making recommendations to the Greene County commission and Greeneville Board of Mayor and Alderman concerning the operations of the solid waste management system in the County including the operation of the transfer station. To date the Greene County Regional Solid Waste Planning Board has submitted all reports to the State in a timely manner. Should the need arise, the Board is prepared to review any solid waste facility permits that come before it.

7. Describe the Region's rationale for formation (its decision to be either single or multi-county).

The rationale behind the Region's decision to remain a single county region was related mostly to the fact that the solid waste facilities of the County have been governed by the Greeneville/Greene County Solid Waste Board prior to the passage of the SWM Act of 1991. County officials did not feel that it would be beneficial to the County form a multi-county region with other entities.

9. Describe the Region, generally, geographically, and demographically.

Greene County is one of the largest counties, by area, in the State. It covers 621.8 square miles and is predominantly rural in setting. Although the County boasts one of the largest industrial population in east Tennessee for a county of 60,900 people living in Greene County, 20,286 of that number live in the County's four incorporated communities. These communities are Baileyton, Greeneville, Mosheim, and Tusculum. From a geographic standpoint, Greene County is characterized by rolling hills, some mountain grades and "prime" farmland. The Nolichucky River flows through a large portion of the County.

There is no fee placed on residents for solid waste collection or management. Tipping fees collected at the jointly owned Greeneville/Greene County Transfer Station/Class IV/Landfill are responsible for funding nearly all of the solid waste costs in the Region. The Town of Greeneville provides commercial collection for some businesses which assists in offsetting costs as well. This current system is working fine, however revenues do not cover expenses and therefore, Greene County and Greeneville appropriate funds from the General Fund each year to cover the extra costs for the Region. Greene County assumes the cost of disposal for Tusculum, the only other community in the Region that provides door-to-door collection and has a solid waste program. No new expenses, fees or revenues are being planned at this time.



These estimates are based on performances of such programs as drop-off recycling and yard waste diversion. Conversations with waste haulers and landfill operators and the general knowledge of solid waste personnel in the Region were used to make these estimates.

5. Discuss any recent demographic trends that may affect waste disposal and generation figures in the Region. Are large groups of people moving into or out of the area for any special reason?

There have been no trends in recent years that would have a noticeable affect on the generation rate of solid waste. However, like any other county, Greene County does experience fluctuations in population related to retirements, job relocations, etc. This fluctuation does not appear to have a significant impact on solid waste generation.

6. **Discuss the economic condition of the Region. Who are major employers? Is the unemployment rate high or low? What economic factors could affect the content and volume of the waste stream and waste reduction efforts in the Region?**

Greene County has an unemployment rate of 9% which is above the State unemployment rate and is above several other counties located near Greene County. The major employers in the Region include Greene Valley Developmental Center, Plus Mark, Walmart Distribution Center, and Five Rivers Manufacturing. Several factors could affect the content and volume of the waste stream. Among these factors is the number and size of commercial/industrial contributors to the waste stream. Job expansion or decline resulting from sales increases or declines can greatly impact the Region's waste stream. Greene County's waste stream is greatly influenced by the large industrial base in the County. Several thousand tons of material is disposed of in Class IV facilities each year from local industries.

Keep Greene Clean, the local Keep America Beautiful affiliate conducts litter surveys, and sponsors litter pick-ups throughout the calendar year. The Greene County Sheriff's Department conducts litter grant programs under the guidance of the Tennessee Department of Transportation Litter Grant Program. The contact person for Keep Greene Clean is Susan Vance, Director.

- 9. Legislation passed by the General Assembly in 1999 adds consideration on an "economic growth adjustment formula) analysis for reporting solid waste disposal figures and progress toward the 25% waste reduction and diversion goal from year to year. Does the Region perceive that this option would express progress on the State's 25% waste reduction goal in a more equitable fashion (a more fair representation of the Region's actual progress?)

Yes, Economic growth should have always been a consideration when measuring a Region's progress toward the 25% waste reduction goal. Almost every Region's waste stream will be affected in some way by economic factors such as industrial expansions, new housing construction, higher retail sales, etc. Some Region's will be affected more than others depending on the rate of growth. The economic growth formula will allow a Region to compensate for an increase in the volume of waste being generated, which can be shown to be a result of an increase in economic activity but not an increase in population. Many people work in Greene County at local industries but may live in neighboring counties.

- 10. Use of a new base year (1995) and new goal year (2003) to achieve the 25% waste reduction and diversion goal are also in the 1999 legislation. Greene county has already been approved to adjust the 1995 base year figure to reflect ongoing waste reduction programs . This adjustment was crucial to Greene County in that it allowed the County to receive credit to waste reduction activities that took place in 1995 that may not have been recognized by the current reporting process. Greene County's new approved 1995 base year figure is 74,157.02 tons

Greene County

Greene County offers a network of 15 staffed and fenced recycling drop-off sites strategically located throughout the County to best serve rural residents. These sites collect paper, tire, batteries, metals, oil, and cardboard. Answering the requests of citizens, Greene County also collects used farm wire which is processed for recycling. These materials are processed and marketed through Greeneville Iron and Paper, the County's only materials processing facility. The recycling program is funded through the County's general fund which is public funded.

Construction and demolition materials are collected at each of these sites and transported to the Greeneville/Greene County Class IV landfill where they are diverted from the Class I waste stream. This effort is a joint partnership between Greeneville and Greene County and has existed for several years.

Greeneville

The Town of Greeneville hosts a number of drop-off sites in the community for collecting paper, cardboard, and metals. These collection sites consist of boxes provided by the Town of Jonesborough through a cooperative agreement with the Jonesborough Recycling Center. Jonesborough provides collection boxes and collects the materials upon call. In return, Jonesborough receives all revenues from the sale of materials. The Town of Greeneville collects paper and occ in collection boxes owned by the Town. Greeneville also separates construction and demolition materials from the waste stream at the landfill where they are placed in the Class IV facility. Keep Greene Clean works with all communities in the County to promote recycling programs, anti-litter programs, and waste diversion programs.

Tusculum

The City of Tusculum operates a door-to-door collection program of recyclables for residents inside the city limits. These items are transported to the Jonesborough Recycling Center where they are processed in exchange, Jonesborough receives all revenues generated from the sale of materials. Tusculum and Greeneville have worked with Jonesborough in this way for several years. This system appears to be serving all communities appropriately.

Greene County operates a network of 15 staffed convenience centers which exceeds the number required for a county of this size or population by the Solid Waste Management Act of 1991.

Greene County had had to deal with a problem that few other counties in the State have faced. The County covers a large number of square miles and is sparsely populated outside of existing incorporated communities. County officials recognized that all citizens should have easy access to solid waste services such as solid waste disposal, special waste collection, and recycling collection. Therefore, the County incurred additional expenses by constructing and operating several convenience centers above the State mandated number. This effort ensured that nearly all residents in the County receive adequate solid waste services. There are no additional needs at this time that are not addressed by the current system.

Officials feel that the current system is working fine with one exception. It is felt that at least one additional collection day is needed in Greene County accommodate citizens disposal needs. The Region partners with Keep Greene Clean, the local Keep America Beautiful affiliate, to sponsor and publicize the event and has the resources to conduct the event 2 times per year. The Region is also interested in the possibility of the State providing financial assistance to establish Regional HHW Collection Sites opened on a permanent basis. Officials feel that the costs involved with conducting one day events simply do not provide the community with an adequate opportunity to dispose of these materials and do not provide the best of funds.

Greene County collects used tires at several convenience center locations throughout the County. The Town of Greeneville also provides collection and transportation for local tire haulers to the tire recycling site. All tires, whether transported by private businesses or hauled by the Town or County, are taken to the Regional tire collection site in Washington County and transferred from this site by Tennessee Tire Recyclers Inc. TTRI transports the tires to any one of several locations in the southeast for recycling.

- 5. Discuss the Region's level of satisfaction with waste tire collection efforts in the area and the State waste tire program. What changes are foreseen? What changes are needed?**

The Region is relatively satisfied with the State's waste tire collection program although officials feel that some changes are needed to update the program with the changing business of tire recycling. The Region would like the State to expand the definition of "end-use" to include civil engineering uses for tires. Although this is not a cure all for the tire recycling headache, it allows more vendors to enter the marketplace of tire recycling while giving the Counties more options for recycling. This "competition" would help to keep tipping fees low and allow more counties to participate in the tire recycling program.

Due to the hard work and countless hours of preparation, nearly all of the programs initiated by Keep Greene Clean achieve a high level of success throughout the community.

Also more efforts needs to be made to provide solid waste education to non-urbanized areas of the Region. Greene County is an extremely large county in square miles, most of which is non-urbanized. It is hoped that education funding provided by the State for adult programs only, will help to provide programming to individuals living outside of incorporated areas of the Region. To date, the Region has not filed an education action plan.

As you are aware, the Solid Waste Management Act of 1991 requires the Solid Waste Regions to plan, monitor, and report on solid waste activities. One of the requirements of this legislation was for each region to prepare a Ten-year Solid Waste Management Plan. The legislation also requires that Five-year updates to those plans be prepared and submitted to the state for review. The Greene County Region's Ten-year plan was approved on March 22, 1996; therefore, your Five-year Update is due to this office by March 22, 2001. Please note that the Update is expected to consider the next 10-year planning horizon, and will become your current Ten-Year Plan upon approval by this office.

Also required by the Solid Waste Act is submittal of a Needs Assessment report for all of the counties within each Development District. The initial Assessment was due by September 30, 1992; with revisions due by April 1, 1999 and every five years after that. The SW Needs Assessment(s) for the counties and municipalities within your region was (were) received on March 29, 1999. Please contact Mr. Chris Craig with the First TN Development District to determine the status of your Region's Needs Assessment report. The Needs Assessment(s) will provide much of the information necessary for the preparation of the Five-year Update to your Ten-Year Plan.
