- Black History Month begins and is an annual observance originating in the United States, where it is also known as African American History Month. Black History Month has received official recognition from governments in the United State, Canada, and most recently has been observed in Ireland and the United Kingdom. Black History Month began as a way of remembering important people and events in the history of the African diaspora. It is celebrated in February in the United States and Canada, while in Ireland and the United Kingdom observes Black History Month in October. - Congenital Heart Defect Awareness Week is observed annually February 7th February 14th. During this week, we recognize and celebrate the journey of children and adults living with congenital heart disease and provide opportunity to raise public awareness about the heart condition and promote education about CHDs. Congenital means a "condition present from birth", which could bring on lifelong complications. CHDs affect approximately one in 100 births every year in the U.S. and is the most common type of birth defect. Congenital heart disease may have several symptoms, especially in babies or children, which are:
 - o Rapid heartbeat
 - Rapid breathing
 - Swelling of the legs, stomach, or around the eyes
 - Extreme tiredness and fatigue
 - Blue tinge to the skin (known as cyanosis)
 - Tiredness and rapid breathing when a baby is feeding

There are many types of congenital heart disease and sometimes they may occur in combinations, the common defects include:

- Septal Defects when there's a hole between two of the heart chambers (commonly known as a "hole in the heart").
- Pulmonary Valve Stenosis when the pulmonary valve, controls the flow of blood out of the lower right chamber of the heart to the lungs, its narrower than normal and cause trouble.
- Transposition of the Great Arteries this is when the pulmonary and aortic valves and the arteries are connected and have swapped positions.
- Underdeveloped Heart when part of the heart does not develop properly making it difficult for it to pump enough blood around the body or lungs.

This week plays a crucial role in providing support to families and individuals affected by CHD. It's a time to come together, share experiences, and offer encouragement to one another. CHD research is essential by understanding, identifying, and treating CHDs, we can improve the prognosis for babies born with these heart defects. Organizations like The Children's Heart Foundation partner with investigators to fund research that can lead to better treatment methods, improve early detection techniques, and ultimately, save lives. Summary: Clinical Research Associates, Inc., does clinical trials which means completing study on human bodies, to see the reaction of investigational medicines and devices. Clinical Research Associates, duty is to recruit patients and be apart of the clinical study, to see if drugs, vaccines, and devices, that evaluated by FDA make sure its safety and effectiveness to be placed on the market.

Clinical trial sites seek out patients that are affected by medical conditions within certain geographical locations and asked to volunteer for a clinical trial. Clinical trials are mainly used to protect the safety, health, and human rights of all patients and before human trials and testing are tried on human beings, chemistry studies are done on the drugs and tested on animals, first.

Clinical trials have (3) safety phases, which consist of 100 or less volunteers, what is the appropriate dosing amount looks like and does the product reduce the severity of the disease, just to name a few. The participation of volunteers is very important because representation from all walks of life such as, race, age, gender, and nationalities are needed because the research and medicine can provide an impact and make a difference within the whole world.
