- Breast Cancer Awareness Month was started in 1985 as a partnership between the American Cancer Society and a pharmaceutical company to promote mammography screening. Since then, this has grown into a global movement that involves various organizations, events, and initiatives to raise funds and awareness for breast cancer research and support. Breast cancer awareness month also aims to address the disparities and barriers that affect the diagnosis and treatment of breast cancer, especially among women of color, men, and under-resourced communities. Breast cancer awareness month encourages everyone to take action for themselves and others, such as getting regular screening, talking about breast health, donating, volunteering, and spreading the word.

## **TOPICS OF DISCUSSION**

Focus: Balancing Act: A Panel on the Challenging Art of Spanish Interpretation

**Presenters:** Dr. Tamara Chavez-Lindell, Dr. Katherine Diaz, Esthela Rios (Latino Memphis), Fernanda Maruri (VUMC), Luisa Malagon and Sofia Muñoz Siso (Centro Hispano)

**Summary:** Today's meeting was a group discussion with a panel providing insight on the challenges, the art, and the skill of Spanish interpretation. We must first understand the difference between translation and interpretation, translation is basically converting text from one language to another language and interpretation is converting direct conversation from one language to another language.

When interpreting the Spanish language, interpreters come to learn of the many different dialects spoken in various countries such as Spain vs Puerto Rico or Mexico vs Nicaragua, which the Spanish language may be the same, but the dialect is totally different. One of the main things, when providing interpretation services, is the vital information given and received by both parties and must be communicated clearly and precisely. It is also important for the interpreter to build a rapport with the client receiving the interpretation services, so they can have an understanding, building a bridge with different cultures and different languages, respectfully, based around the sensitive information, situations and subjects being stated amongst one another.

The other important factor to using an interpretation service is to avoid using children, to interpret for their parents and family members. Children cannot interpret adult information such as doctor diagnosis's, social work information or even lawyer to client documentations, these are just a few named challenges, but a certified interpreter brings much value to many entities such as the medical field, the judicial system, social work, and education. Currently there's no standard protocol to becoming a certified interpreter but folks will need some form of training, if folks would like to delve into becoming bilingual below are a few resources National Board of Certification for Medical Interpreters, National Center for State Courts and National Interpreter Association.

- Tennessee Strong Families Grant Program Governor Bill Lee announced that applications are now open for the <u>Tennessee Strong Families Grant Program</u>, which dedicates \$20 million to improve access to maternal healthcare and boost critical resources for mothers, children and families by supporting local nonprofits across the state, including pregnancy centers. In the state's FY23-24 budget, the Governor and General Assembly funded \$20 million to create the Strong Families Grant Program and provide the opportunity for nonprofit organizations, including pregnancy centers, to partner with the state to provide support based on the unique needs of the mothers, children, and families they serve. Examples of these services include:
  - Direct services for pregnancy support, which can include medical, mental health or other counseling services.

- Support for Tennesseans who are considering adoption.
- · Workforce assistance to prepare new moms for self-sufficiency.
- Housing assistance to help moms in crisis find a safe and stable place to live.
- Additional wraparound services to support vulnerable mothers and their children.

Application materials for the grants are available <u>online</u> where applicants may view webinars and access training and technical assistance. The grant program is just one facet of the Governor's Strong Tennessee Families initiative, which dedicated a <u>historic</u> investment of more than \$600 million in the State's FY23-24 budget.
