TOPICS OF DISCUSSION

Focus: Health Disparities Task Force Survey

Presenter: Bethsahida Harrigan

Summary: Today's discussion was based around last week's poll, and the health disparities task force four main topics which are chronic disease, mental health, infectious disease, and environmental justice and health. The two most popular topics from the poll, we're speaking about today is chronic disease and mental health. We're asking questions to receive feedback, answers, and recommendations from our Task Force Affiliates, so we can submit a report of recommendations to our commissioner and state legislators. Below you will find the questions that were asked, and the responses received:

Question #1: What aspect or components would the task force members like to see addressed or included in the report of recommendations to agency leadership? The two most popular topics where chronic disease and mental health, but let's start with chronic disease, first:

List of responses for Chronic Disease:

- Diabetes
- Hypertension
- Cancer
- Heart Attack
- Stroke
- Autism Neurological Chronic Disease
- Chronic Lung Disease
- Alzheimer's Disease
- Chronic Kidney Disease
- STD's /HIV in Rural Health and underserved populations

Question #2: What aspect or components would the task force members like to see addressed regarding mental health in the report of recommendations to agency leadership? Below is the list of responses for Mental Health:

- Shortage of mental health providers in the state of Tennessee
- Need to invest to increase multilingual, multicultural mental health workforce
- Provide mental health resources for caregivers
- Post-Partum Depression
- Ideas for mental health increase access to the mental health workforce for people of color (awareness and culturally, increasing the cultural relevance resources for diverse cultures and the issues they face day to day to reduce stigma around mental health and lastly improve affordability of mental health resource

Question #3: What are some reasons that people are still hesitant around vaccines, especially moms and kids?

- Work on reducing the misinformation and miscommunication around vaccines for adults and children, through church leaders, families, peers, public health providers, health educations, local healthcare retail stores, school nurses' community leaders, social media, local media, employers, and influencers
- Have the healthcare providers, physicians, pediatricians present a "Speak Up, Speak Out Messages"
- Work toward recovering CDC creditability
- Publicize the percentages more and accurately
- Invite March of Dimes to share more
- Create a checklist

Question #4: What messages should healthcare providers be providing to pregnant women that we're not seeing or missing specifically for minorities and underserved populations?

- We would like to make certain that providers take cultural awareness for labor and delivery
- We would like to see more cultural humility training requirements for OB providers and nursing staff in women's health clinics
- Need more cultural humility training requirements for OB providers and nursing staff in women's health clinics
- Increase the uptake of the HPV vaccine to adolescents through social media
- Discussion about hypertension in pregnant mothers and how it can become toxic to the mother and the child
- Expansion of TennCare for a year for mom and child/ren for health and dental
