#### NOUNS

- Gendered nouns
  - $\cdot$  Masculine  $\rightarrow$  usually end in -o
  - $\cdot$  Feminine  $\rightarrow$  usually end in –a
  - Other endings vary in gender
- Articles (specifying a noun the/a/an)
  - Match gender and number of the noun


