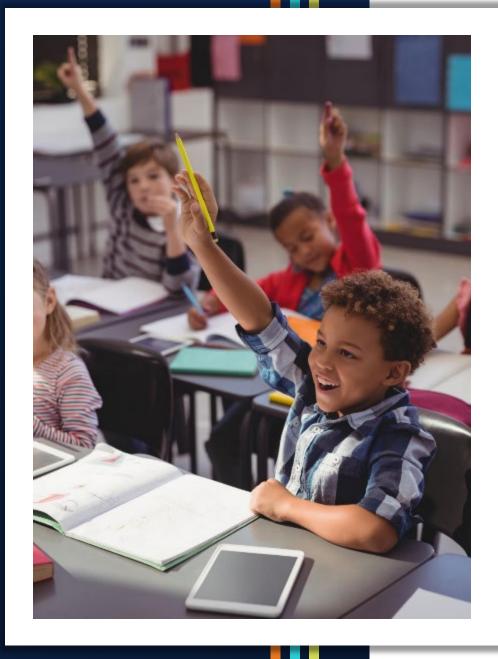

Overview of Legal Requirements

Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) Relevant Federal Requirements (Title IA)

- Assessments
 - Technically sound, standards-aligned, administered to all students
 - o Math & ELA: Each year 3-8 and at least once 9-12
 - Science: At least once 3-5, 6-9, AND 10-12
 - o Alternative assessments (1% of students with disabilities)
 - o English Language Proficiency Assessment for non-native English speakers
- Accountability
 - Establish long-term goals
 - System of *meaningful differentiation* of schools
 - o Specifications for indicators (calculation of achievement)
 - School designations

State Law

- School Letter Grades (system of meaningful differentiation)
- Use of achievement and growth
- State board approvals for goals and designations



SBE Intersections with Accountability

- T.C.A. § 49-1-602, the State Board of Education is required to establish "appropriate performance goals and measures for schools and local education agencies (LEAs)."
- T.C.A. § 49-1-619 requires the Commissioner of Education to obtain approval from the State Board for "changes to the formula used to calculate school or LEA performance goals and measures."
- Annual approval of Annual Measurable Objectives (performance targets incorporated into school and district accountability)
- Annual approval school and district designations

U.S. Ed ESSA Compliance Findings

Summary of Accountability Findings & Engagement



Federal Compliance: Required Actions

- 1. TDOE **must** constrain the high school achievement indicator to a single math and ELA course, for a cohort of students.
- 2. TDOE **must** discontinue the substitutions of ACT results in the calculation of the math achievement indicator.
- 3. TDOE **must** determine all permissible options for off-grade testing.
- 4. TDOE **must** change its federal graduation rate reporting by removing students with disabilities, receiving a traditional diploma, without completing Algebra II or Integrated III from the numerator (graduates).





Engagement on U.S. Ed Compliance Findings

- U.S. Department of Education: Tennessee Monitoring Report
 - Findings documentation
 - Communication from U.S. Ed
- October/November 2022: The department held 8 regional meetings with superintendents.
- December 16, 2022: The department convened the State Advisory Plan Group to share high-level feedback with the group.
- December 19, 2022 January 9, 2023: Public comment was open on the amendment

1. Constraining high school achievement indicator to a single math & ELA course, for a cohort of students

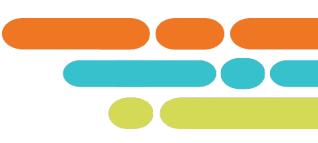
 Achievement indicator must be a single, standards-aligned assessment of ELA and math administered to all students within the same cohort year (acceleration excepted).

Proposed:

- TDOE will constrain the achievement indicator to English II and '9th Grade Math'.
 - 2022-23 9th grade math means either Algebra I or Integrated I scale scores
 - 2023-24 the department is developing a solution to bring Algebra I and Integrated I onto the same scale through an augmented standard setting process.
- TDOE will 'cohort results' during the 10th grade.
 - Any students taking Algebra I, Integrated I, or any other more advanced math EOC in the 9th grade will have those results 'banked' and reported the following year.
 - All students taking Algebra IB or Integrated IB in the 10th grade will have their results reported in that year.
 - Students taking the alternative assessment will still be able to test in 11th grade.
- This change is required; **Tennessee has no discretion on this monitoring finding**. Adjustment goes into effect for the 2022-23 accountability cycle.

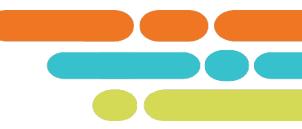


2. Removal of ACT substitutions for achievement indicator



- 11th grade students having already completed Algebra II or Integrated III will no longer be able to contribute an ACT score to the achievement indicator calculation.
 - Assessments incorporated into achievement indicators must be shown to measure the depth and breadth of Tennessee state standards.
 - -Adjustment will be accounted for in the production of AMOs.
- This change is required; **Tennessee has no discretion on this monitoring finding**. Adjustment goes into effect for the 2022-23 accountability cycle.

3. All permissible options for off-grade testing



- Tennessee has been directed to pursue a waiver stipulating all forms of acceptable off-grade testing.
 - Presently, the only permissible form of off-grade testing is Algebra I or Integrated I in 8th grade.

Proposed:

- Math
 - EoC acceleration can begin in 7th grade*
 - Grade-level acceleration is permissible for 6th grade (either 7th or 8th assessments)
- ELA
 - EoC acceleration may begin in 8th grade*
 - Grade-level acceleration may begin in 7th grade (8th grade assessment)
- This change is required; Tennessee has no discretion on this monitoring finding. Adjustment goes into effect for the 2022-23 accountability cycle.

^{*} Options presented here ensure existence of 'accountable assessment' in 9th grade

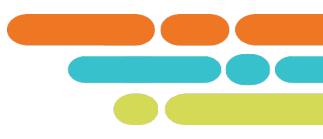
4. Graduation rate adjustment for students with disabilities receiving a traditional diploma without Algebra II or Integrated III

- For federal graduation rate reporting, U.S. Ed will only recognize students receiving a traditional diploma if they have completed the same required courses.
 - This change only applies to reporting and <u>does not supersede</u> State Board rule and policy governing the <u>awarding of traditional diplomas to students with</u> <u>disabilities</u>.
 - This change does not require any adjustments for student course placement.
 - This change will not impact and should not change what students experience in the classroom.
 - Graduation rate indicator is only weighted at 5% for high schools, only.

 This change is required; Tennessee has no discretion on this monitoring finding. Adjustment goes into effect for the 2022-23 accountability cycle.



Public Feedback Received



Feedback on constraining ELA and Math indicator

- If a school's achievement indicator could be the direct result of one math teacher and one English teacher, that would place a great amount of pressure on educators.
- This could potentially discourage districts from teaching Algebra in grade 8.

Feedback on removing ACT in achievement indicator

- Ensure that accelerated students' scores are included in accountability.
- Continue to promote advance coursework for students who are ready.

Feedback on Off-Grade Testing

 There should be a way for advanced students to take advanced classes and schools to receive credit in their accountability measures for these students.

Feedback on graduation rate adjustment

- Having different federal and state metrics could cause confusion.
- There are concerns with how the department will track this data.
- Determine if SBE could change the graduation requirements rule/policy to remove Algebra II from the requirements.



Next Steps

- Submitted preliminary amendment to the U.S. Ed late Jan. 2023.
- Present proposed amendment to State Board of Education on Feb. 10, 2023.
- Submit final amendment to U.S. Ed in February.
- Present amendment details in statewide webinar.
- Pending approval of the amendment from U.S. Ed, calculate 2022-23 AMOs and present to SBE for approval in March.
