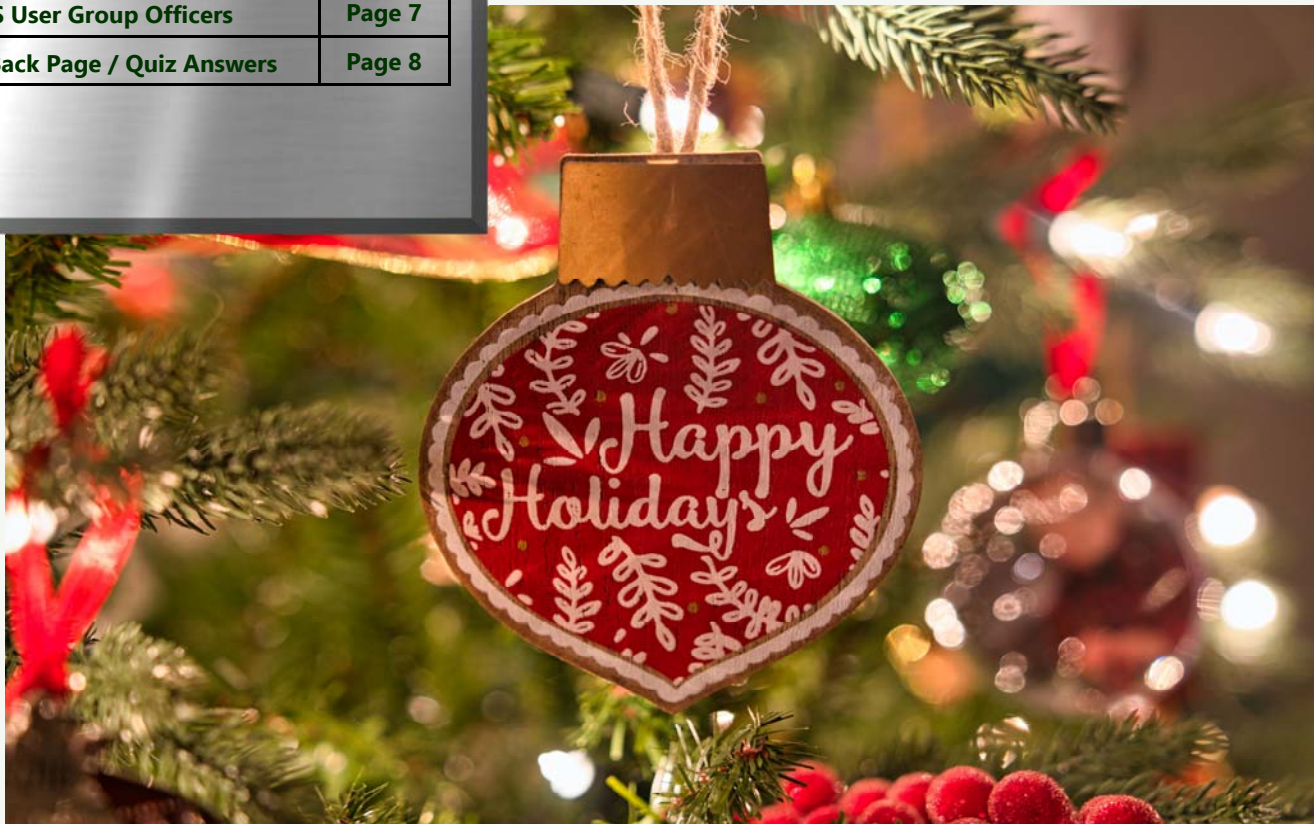

1. A woman was apprehended for shoplifting food items and a DVD set at a chain department store. When loss prevention checked the store's database, that the woman had been caught shoplifting items at one of the chain's other stores and was banned from all of the chain's locations

2. A man entered a chain department store by breaking the door glass after the store was closed for the night. As he exited the store, he was apprehended by police. In his possession were a tent, a pillow, and a radio. The man had previously been banned by the store for shoplifting.

NARRITIVES

Incident narratives form the “meat and potatoes” of a report. All of the details of an incident are so it can tell a story of what happened to the individual or individuals involved.

For instance, if a Simple Assault incident occurred between a husband and wife, those details would need to be entered along with information such as time and date, the reason for the assault (e.g., argument, injuries, etc.) If those details are not entered, the incident lacks the story to back up the rest of the reported details.

Note: In the case reporting a warrant, please make narratives resembling “Arrest warrant served to John Smith for a Simple Assault at 1500 and taken to Davidson County Jail,” and not like “Warrant for John Smith.”

In the case of the latter sample narrative, we would lack the information shown in the rest of the report. Why was there a warrant for this individual? How did it occur? Report all this information so everything on the report can be correlated.
