St. Nicholas derived from Nicholas of Myra and was a bishop in 4th century Greece. He was known for selling off his own items and then giving the money to the poor. He would commonly leave coins in people's shoes and dedicated his entire life to serving people who were sick and suffering.

As time passed St. Nicholas Day began in different ways:

- In Italy, this day was celebrated with feasts, gift-giving, and festivals.
- In Germany and the Netherlands, children would leave their shoes or special St. Nicholas boots in front of the fireplace.
- The history of St. Nicholas and his good deeds was part of the inspiration of the modern-day Santa Claus and Father Christmas.
- Other traditions include, leaving small gifts in a stocking above the fireplace.

December 7th National Pearl Harbor Remembrance Day

The day Japan attacked the United States at Pearl Harbor, is commemorated with the National Pearl Harbor Day of Remembrance each year on December 7th. On that day in 1941, more than 2,400 people died in Japan's attack on the Hawaiian base of America's Pacific Fleet. Hundreds of aircraft were destroyed or damaged, as were most of the ships in the harbor, and thousands of service men and women were killed or injured. It was an unprecedented surprise attack that precipitated the United States entry into World War II.

Why Should We Honor this Day?

- The worst attack on American soil, to date
- Marked the beginning of the U.S. into WWII
- Honors the U.S. Military response & the lives lost in the attack

December 8th Bodhi Day - Buddhist

Bodhi Day is observed to mark the moment that took place 2,500 years ago when Siddhartha Gautama achieved enlightenment and became the Buddha or 'awakened one'.

How the Day is Observed

Buddhists commemorate this day by:

- Meditating
- Studying the 'dharma' ('universal truth or law')
- Chanting sutras (Buddhist texts)
- Performing kind acts towards other beings
- Cooking a meal of tea and cakes
- Bodhi tree plantings are held throughout the month
- Incense and multi-colored lights are displayed during the following month in the capital city of Tokyo and in towns and villages across the country.

Human Rights Day on December 10 remembers the day the General Assembly of the U.N. adopted and proclaimed the Universal Declaration of Human Rights in 1948. It is one of the most translated documents in the world and is available in over 500 languages. It has inspired countries and people alike to start treating every person with the right to life, liberty, property, and the pursuit of happiness.

The Declaration of Human Rights isn't legally binding, but each member of the United Nations strives to establish the standard of living for each respective nation.

December 7th – 15th (Sundown to Sundown) Hanukkah - Jewish

What is Hanukkah?

Hanukkah (means dedication), also known as the Festival of Lights, is an eight-day Jewish holiday commemorating the rededication of the Holy Temple (the Second Temple) in Jerusalem at the time of the Maccabean Revolt of the 2nd century BCE. Hanukkah is observed for eight nights and days, starting on the 25th day of Kislev according to the Hebrew calendar, which may occur at any time from late November to late December in the Gregorian calendar.

How is Hanukkah Observed?

Hanukkah is observed by lighting the menorah (each night light one additional candle to the number from the previous night), playing dreidel, and eating special foods unique to Hanukkah. Some people also sing Hanukkah songs or exchange gifts after lighting the menorah, which is also called a hanukkiah. Many people host and attend Hanukkah parties.

During the week of Kwanzaa, families and communities come together to share a feast, to honor the ancestors, affirm the bonds between them, and to celebrate African and African American culture. Each day they light a candle to highlight the principle of that day and to breathe meaning into the principles with various activities, such as reciting the sayings or writings of great black thinkers and writers, reciting original poetry, African drumming, and sharing a meal of African inspired foods.

The origin of the name of Kwanzaa

Kwanzaa gets its name from the Swahili phrase, "matunda ya kwanza" and is rooted in first fruit celebrations which are found in cultures throughout Africa both in ancient and modern times.
