Changes to the Tennessee Student Assistance Award

Staff Recommendation

To increase award amounts of the Tennessee Student Assistance Award (TSAA) for the Community Colleges and Tennessee Colleges of Applied Technology in the 2022-23 academic year.

Background

Increasing award amounts for the Community Colleges and TCATs will align with several agency policy objectives:

- 1) Ensure more TSAA funding is awarded to those in need;
- Assist students who have not taken advantage of Tennessee Promise and are not yet eligible for Tennessee Reconnect; and
- 3) Support the state's efforts to grow enrollment in workforce-ready credential programs.

Given recent declines in the TSAA take-up rate, recurring funds are available to provide for increased awards. Due to an anticipated higher take-up rate, TSAC will cease awarding earlier in the award cycle and re-evaluate expenditures after the award certification deadline. If necessary, additional awards will be made at that time to ensure the appropriation is spent and the reserve balance is brought in line with the board's intended 10% target of annual appropriations.
