PACT Act

- The Sergeant First Class (SFC) Heath Robinson Honoring our Promise to Address Comprehensive Toxics (PACT) Act is a law that expands VA health care and benefits for Veterans exposed to burn pits, Agent Orange, and other toxic substances. It is the most significant expansion of benefits and services for toxin-exposed Veterans in more than 30 years.
- The PACT Act adds over 20 more presumptive conditions for burn pits, Agent Orange, and other toxic exposures and adds more presumptive-exposure locations for Agent Orange and radiation.
- While the PACT Act doesn't expire, Veterans or survivors who <u>file a claim</u> or submit their <u>intent to file a claim</u> for PACT Act-related benefits on or before August 9, 2023, may have their benefits backdated to August 10, 2022, the date of the law's signing.
- Applications may be securely submitted online via VA.GOV or in person at any Regional Office.
