TDVS Updates

<u>Claims Management System – Request for Proposals</u>

On May 28th, TDVS released a Request for Proposals (RFP) to solicit a potential replacement for VetraSpec, the current claims management system.

Why it matters: The decision to replace VetraSpec follows a review process started in April 2022, led by a working group of State and County Veteran Service Officers. Their recommendations have shaped the criteria for the RFP.

What's new: The vendor response deadline has been extended to July 12, 2024.

VA and Veteran Benefit Updates

VA Adds Three New Cancer Types as Presumptives for Gulf War and Post-9/11 Veterans

Three cancer types have been included in the list of presumptive diseases through a sub-regulatory policy letter published to the <u>Federal Register</u>.

- Male Breast Cancer
- Urethral Cancer
- Cancer of the Paraurethral Gland

Why it matters: This policy establishes presumptions of service connection for eligible Gulf War and post-9/11 Veterans who deployed to Afghanistan, Somalia, Djibouti, Egypt, Jordan,



Lebanon, Syria, Yemen, Uzbekistan, and the entire <u>Southwest Asia theater of operations</u>, which includes Iraq.

VA is currently drafting regulations to implement the PACT Act. Due to the time required to promulgate regulations, VA implemented the law and began processing PACT Act-related claims on January 1, 2023, based on the sub-regulatory guidance contained in the Policy Letter issued in December 2022. This sub-regulatory guidance replaces the December 2022 Policy Letter and makes other clarifying changes.

VBA VSO Quarterly Updates

Among other updates, VA shared MST claims processing updates to comply with two Public Laws. VA is providing an option for a Veteran to elect to be referred to a VHA MST coordinator or have VBA automatically notify VHA at certain times in the claims process.

Dig deeper: VA will implement these changes, in part, through updated forms (VA Forms 21-0781 and 20-0995) that include a consent option.

- The new version of VA Form 21-0781, dated March 2024, <u>released on June 28, 2024</u>. All mental health disorders not just PTSD are now included and the VA Form 21-0781a will be discontinued. The substantive edits to the form, include:
 - New sections that help the claimant complete the form with their type of inservice traumatic event(s),
 - Guidance with examples for describing the traumatic event(s),
 - Expanding the behavioral changes question; including if a report was filed and/or if another source can be used for evidentiary purposes,
 - New section requesting treatment information and locations, and
 - New signature sections allowing witnesses, a POA, or an alternate signer to sign on behalf of the claimant.
- The new version of VA Form 20-0995, dated May 2024, <u>released on June 28, 2024</u>. The substantive edits to the form, include:
 - o New question identifying the benefit type the claimant is requesting,
 - o New claimant's section,
 - New homeless section,



- Treatment information and location section edited to match other forms in inventory, and
- Additional signature sections allowing witnesses, a POA, or an alternate signer to sign on behalf of claimant.

VetraSpec is aware of the form updates and working to incorporate into Tennessee's forms library. The previous versions can still be used as described in M21-1, Part II, Subpart i, 2.B.4. (Handling Outdated or Discontinued Forms).

No Copays for First Three Outpatient Mental Health Visits Each Year Through 2027

Veterans no longer need to pay copays for their first three outpatient mental health care and substance use disorder visits of each calendar year through 2027.

Why it matters: This benefit expands Veterans' access to mental health services and lowers their out-of-pocket costs.

Dig deeper: This copayment exemption benefits dates to June 27, 2023, and – by law – will end on December 29, 2027. To be eligible for this exemption, the outpatient visit must be with a qualified mental health professional at VA or provided through VA's network of community care providers. VA will automatically refund Veterans for any copays paid to VA on or after June 27, 2023, for these appointments, with no further action required by those Veterans.

<u>VetraSpec Update 24-1 - New Functionality</u>

Tennessee VetraSpec Users received the VetraSpec 24.1 update Saturday, May 11th.

What do I need to do:



- **1** If you haven't already, clear your browser cache. *This is a very important step; many of the post-update issues that users experience result from failure to clear the cache.*
- <u>Instructions for Firefox users</u> (Check "Cached Web Content")
- Instructions for Chrome users (Choose "All Time" and check "Cached images and files")
- **2 –** If you haven't already, please use the control panel to set up multi-factor authentication for your account.
- Select "Control Panel" from the left-hand side of the VetraSpec Home screen.
- Select "Multi Factor Authentication" from the top VetraSpec menu.
- Set up multi-factor authentication using either email or authenticator app.
- **3 –** Establish a VA authentication method to prepare to take advantage of the new Benefits Claims functionality.
- Instructions for ID.me
- Instructions for Login.gov (Validates with PIV)
- **4 –** If you have filing capability, start using the VBMS tab to view information from VBMS (POA, ITF) for your Veterans.



5 – Keep an eye out for future bulletins that will provide details on using the Benefits Claims filing capability. <u>Thank you to State and County users</u> for supporting ongoing validation testing!

Advocate Spotlight

National Veterans Legal Services (NVLSP) Advocacy Update

All but one of the appeals that have reached a conclusion at the Court of Appeals for Veterans Claims (CAVC) have been resolved in the Veteran or appellant's favor.

By the numbers: TDVS established an advocacy partnership with NVLSP in July of 2019. Since that time, TDVS has sent over 1,300 Board of Veterans' Appeals denials to NVLSP for review. NVLSP has offered appellate representation at the Court of Appeals for Veterans Claims (CAVC) to approximately 24% of these claimants.
