2 CHAIRMAN FOX: Good morning,
3 ladies and gentlemen. We will call the June 4th
4 meeting of the Elevator and Amusement Device
5 Safety Board Meeting to order.

6 And, Mr. Hale, I'm going to ask you
7 to lead us in the Pledge. Will that be okay?

8 MR. HALE: Absolutely.

9 CHAIRMAN FOX: I'll ask
10 everybody to stand.

11 (Whereupon, the Pledge of Allegiance
12 was recited.)

13 CHAIRMAN FOX: Mr. Deason,
14 could you tell us what we need to do in reference
15 to a public forum?

16 MR. DEASON: Yes, sir.

17 So if some of you haven't been to a
18 board meeting lately, we have a policy that we ask
19 people to sign up in advance if you want to make a
20 comment on an agenda item. The comments need to
21 be limited to actionable agenda items, things
22 that -- if you have a copy of the agenda, you can
23 see. We ask that you limit your comment period to
24 three minutes.

25 If you are presenting, like if you

1 have a variance before the Board or something like
2 that, if you are presenting, you don't need to
3 sign up for public comment and you're not limited
4 as a presenter. But if you are not presenting and
5 you want to speak to an issue, an item on the
6 agenda, we ask you to please sign up back there so
7 we'll know.

8 Thank you.

9 CHAIRMAN FOX: Thank you, sir.

10 At this point, we have Introductions
11 and Announcements.

12 Mr. Herrod, I guess you're first
13 because you're sitting in the first chair.

14 MR. HERROD: Thank you.

11 CHAIRMAN FOX: And we have one
12 gentleman signing in.

13 We'll let you tell us who you are,
14 sir.

15 MR. HAYNES: Ryan Haynes.
16 Nice to be with y'all.

17 CHAIRMAN FOX: Thanks for
18 being here.

19 Okay. Moving right along, I would
20 entertain a motion to adopt the agenda.

21 MS. O'CONNOR: So moved.
22 Kelly O'Connor. I'll move to approve the agenda.

23 MR. POPE: Second.

24 CHAIRMAN FOX: And Mr. Pope
25 has seconded. All in favor of the motion, let it

1 be known by saying, "aye."

2 (Affirmative response.)

3 CHAIRMAN FOX: All opposed,
4 like sign.

5 (No verbal response.)

6 CHAIRMAN FOX: Item Number 5,
7 Approval of the Meeting Minutes for December the
8 5th, 2023, and I would entertain a motion to
9 approve the minutes as presented.

10 MR. HALE: So moved.

11 MR. MOORE: Second.

12 CHAIRMAN FOX: We have a
13 motion and a second. Any discussion?

14 (No verbal response.)

15 CHAIRMAN FOX: Hearing none,
16 all in favor of the motion, let it be known by
17 saying, "aye."

18 (Affirmative response.)

19 CHAIRMAN FOX: All opposed,
20 like sign.

21 (No verbal response.)

22 CHAIRMAN FOX: Mr. Steele, I
23 believe you're up, sir.

24 MR. STEELE: Good morning.

25 This shows the statewide growth over the last

1 five years. We've grown approximately 1,700
2 conveyances over the last five years, about 340 a
3 year, for a total of 16,785 at the moment.

4 This shows the notable growth. Of
5 course, Davidson County, everybody knows, is a hot
6 spot. Quite a bit of growth is in the east now:
7 Knoxville, Sevier County, Hamilton County.
8 There's a lot there. Williamson County is
9 catching on pretty good too. There's a lot of
10 growth there. Shelby County, even though we don't
11 do Memphis, there's only nine there in the county,
12 but considering the amount of that area that we
13 cover, that's still notable growth there.

14 This total conveyance is broke down
15 in the West, Middle, and East. We have three
16 inspectors that cover West Tennessee. They cover
17 a total of 1,598 conveyances. In Middle
18 Tennessee, we have 15 inspectors that cover 8,945
19 conveyances. East Tennessee has 12 inspectors
20 that cover 6,242 conveyances.

21 We've had one inspector to retire
22 this year. We have his replacement hired. He
23 starts the 16th of this month. And we have added
24 an apprentice to our staff to try to train an
25 inspector from the ground up.

1 Delinquents across the state. We
2 have 1 in West Tennessee, there's 18 in Middle
3 Tennessee and 23 in East Tennessee, for
4 .25 percent delinquent rate. And this chart shows
5 that trend going down for our delinquent rate.

6 I believe that's all I have.

7 CHAIRMAN FOX: Any questions
8 for Mr. Steele?

9 MR. POPE: Are the
10 delinquencies -- is that just because of manpower?

11 MR. STEELE: Some of them are
12 little churches out in rural areas that you can't
13 get into and, you know, buildings that have closed
14 down, ownership's changed, things like that. Most
15 of them are due to that, not manpower at the
16 moment. We're fully staffed.

17 MR. POPE: Got you. Thank
18 you.

19 CHAIRMAN FOX: Okay. Thank
20 you very much.

21 Mr. Hardy?

22 MR. HARDY: Thank you,
23 Chairman.

24 I've got a different graph to start
25 off with as we've had in our previous meetings.

1 We've started tracking the actual companies that
2 have valid operating permits at any given time.
3 So this data was taken on May the 26, and we have
4 528 active companies as of May the 26.

5 For the fiscal year, we permitted 446
6 companies, and we have around 86 companies that
7 are pending renewals between now and the end of
8 the fiscal year, which would be June 30. So that
9 would give us a projection of 532 companies that
10 we should permit, around that number, in Fiscal
11 Year '24.

12 Now, this graph shows our actual
13 permits issued during the fiscal year. Last year,
14 you could see we finished up with 493. Again, as
15 of 5/26, we were at 446 companies permitted.
16 Shows our projection there again as 532. We feel
17 very confident that we'll hit 500 permits during
18 the fiscal year. It will be the first time the
19 Unit has hit 500 permits.

20 This graph will actually plateau over
21 time, but as we've shown before at previous board
22 meetings, you can see the dip there due to the
23 COVID years, '20 through '21. And it looks like
24 the industry in the state is recovering well from
25 that. That was a difficult time for the amusement

1 industry. But again, we will hit -- or surpass
2 500 permits for the fiscal year by the end of this
3 month.

4 New operating permits, we don't
5 really have any idea how many new companies that
6 we'll permit within a given year. We have various
7 companies that close for whatever reasons, and as
8 the industry expands, we can pick up new
9 companies. But that's a prorated estimate of 87
10 companies.

11 Right now -- or as of 5/26, we were
12 at 79 new companies permitted for this year. And
13 this graph will bell curve. But again, you can
14 see the effects of COVID, '20 through '21. So it
15 looks like we're going to have a double bell curve
16 here due to COVID and hopefully with a gradual
17 decrease on the following side of that.

18 Amusement devices inspected or
19 registered for the companies. This graph will
20 follow the same trend as the companies permitted.
21 It will be a direct correlation. Again, we see
22 this as eventually plateauing over time, with
23 maybe a gradual increase as the industry continues
24 to prosper and do well.

25 Accidents, which that's why we're

1 here. We recorded three reportable accidents for
2 this fiscal year. That's accidents which we
3 classify as being reportable, as there was an
4 issue with the device where corrective actions
5 could be made to apply to avoid the possibility of
6 reoccurrence of those type of accidents.

7 And then the final graph we have here
8 is the classification of those three accidents
9 we've had. We had a Dollywood Lightning Rod
10 coaster. We had a -- they renovated that coaster
11 this past year. We had a theme ornament on the
12 side of the cars; it created a puncture on one of
13 the guests, and we worked with Dollywood. They
14 worked with their maintenance department and
15 remedied that situation by grinding down that
16 point and making a bevel there, so we don't
17 anticipate having any other problems with that.

18 K&S Southern Midways, back in
19 September, had a Tubs of Fun ride. It's a ride
20 where each tub has a spinning wheel, and the wheel
21 was not solid. It had braces inside, but a patron
22 had their arm in there and received a broken arm.
23 So we've taken that -- or the company has taken
24 that particular device out of service.

25 And then one of our newer theme parks

1 over in Sevierville, Dig'n Zone, shortly after
2 they opened up -- they have actual excavators that
3 patrons can get on and play various games and move
4 dirt or rocks or those kind of things. We had a
5 young patron that was sitting in an area he
6 shouldn't have been sitting in, in the excavator,
7 and with the indexing that was set up, he had a
8 slight pinch when the excavator was indexed all
9 the way to one side. So corrective actions were
10 made, those indexes were adjusted, and we don't
11 anticipate having any more issues there.

12 We've got fair season. It's warming up
13 outside, as everyone knows. We've got fair season
14 that officially starts with the County Fair today,
15 with the Clay County Fair, and fair season in
16 Tennessee will go through late September to
17 mid-October. We'll support right at 60 county and
18 other fairs between now and, again, late
19 September, mid-October.

20 That's all I have to report on, but I
21 would be glad to answer any questions that the
22 Board may have.

23 CHAIRMAN FOX: And I just want
24 to state, Mr. Pope has invited everybody down to
25 the Clay County Fair. He says --

1 MR. POPE: I'll feed you.

2 Come on. Don't matter to me. I got it.

3 CHAIRMAN FOX: He said he's
4 ready to show.

5 MR. POPE: Polish sausage and
6 corn dogs for everybody.

7 CHAIRMAN FOX: That's right.

8 MR. HARDY: Fiddlesticks.

9 MR. POPE: I got the
10 fiddlesticks.

11 MR. HARDY: Any questions?

12 MR. POPE: I do have one, and
13 not to make it hard on the Unit. But even myself,
14 when we're set up out there on the road and doing
15 a fair, something like that, you're going to have
16 accidents, small accidents and things like that.

17 Can we either send out a mailing or
18 maybe an email as to what our actual requirements
19 are so that there's no mistaking of that by any
20 company? Even myself, I just -- I call Jennifer
21 or I call you, and, you know, even if it's
22 something small. And I know that's taking your
23 time, but I would rather be safe than sorry.

24 And the way that we operate, it's a
25 little bit different than the park operation

1 because it's standard and the people usually come
2 back. We're gone after Saturday, and sometimes we
3 don't even hear about, maybe, if an accident
4 has -- and that's the busiest night, usually. We
5 may not even hear about it.

6 And in the case -- and not taking up
7 for anybody, because I thought it was bad the way
8 they did it, but even that one little Tubs of Fun
9 accident, you know, they didn't report it. That
10 was the problem. I don't know that it was any
11 worse than any other accidents or whatever, but it
12 just wasn't reported.

13 MR. HARDY: That's correct.

14 MR. POPE: Can we maybe get a
15 clarification as to exact -- I know we were -- at
16 one time it was only if they were transported by
17 ambulance. And then we changed that a little bit,
18 if they seek professional care, whatever. But,
19 you know, anybody that's got a child is going to
20 take it to the emergency room.

21 I've even had them to transport by
22 ambulance because they didn't have transportation
23 there other than someone else and they didn't want
24 to take them away from their fun. So they go in
25 an ambulance. Well, that shut down two of my

1 rides for a weekend. That was probably six,
2 seven years ago, maybe even longer than that,
3 probably -- maybe ten years ago.

4 MR. HARDY: Absolutely. We
5 can do that. We've done similar email blasts in
6 the past.

7 MR. POPE: Just for
8 clarification, just to bring everybody up to
9 speed.

10 MR. HARDY: Exactly.

11 MR. POPE: Like I said, not so
12 much on me as a smaller carnival. But the larger
13 carnivals, I mean, you have something every day.
14 I mean, it's going to be some little something, a
15 trip --

16 MR. HARDY: Trip and fall.

17 MR. POPE: -- a fall, you
18 know. And then if it's a broken arm or sprain --
19 you just don't know. We don't know exactly where
20 we're at.

21 MR. HARDY: Right.

22 MR. POPE: No fault to y'all
23 at all.

24 MR. HARDY: We can and we will
25 do that. It's a good time of the year to do that,

1 reiterate our process.

2 As far as transport goes, the law
3 just simply reads, transport patron to an off-site
4 licensed medical facility. And in our opinion,
5 that could be by ambulance; it could be by mom,
6 dad, friend, anyone. So we can make some
7 clarifications and send an email blast out.

8 MR. POPE: Nine times out of
9 ten, we just don't know.

10 MR. HARDY: Exactly.

11 MR. POPE: We don't know what
12 they did.

13 MR. HARDY: Exactly.

14 MR. POPE: We don't mind to do
15 whatever paperwork or whatever we have to do. But
16 if you don't know, it's hard to be responsible.

17 MR. HARDY: That's right. And
18 on your part and the company's part, it's always
19 better to err on the side of caution. And that's
20 what we -- our compliance officers go out in the
21 field, trampoline parks, you know. If there's any
22 doubt, send us an accident report in, and we'll
23 review video and photos and make a decision, you
24 know, based on that.

25 We'll get one out. We'll get one out

1 soon.

2 MR. POPE: Thank you.

3 MR. HARDY: Any more
4 questions?

5 CHAIRMAN FOX: Y'all are doing
6 a good job, you and the elevator group as well.

7 MR. HARDY: Thank you, sir.

8 CHAIRMAN FOX: I wanted to say
9 that. Thank you.

10 Okay. Moving into Old Business. The
11 K&S Southern Midway. It is a penalty order
12 appeal.

13 Mr. Herrod, do you want to address
14 that first or let Mr. Hardy?

15 MR. HERROD: I'll let
16 Mr. Hardy talk about that.

17 MR. HARDY: I discussed that a
18 little bit ago. In an accident that occurred in
19 September of last year, there was a ten-day delay.
20 The patron was airlifted, to our knowledge, from
21 the Jackson area to Memphis, and the company
22 failed to report that accident/incident to us, so
23 we assessed a \$3,000 penalty for that ten-day
24 delay.

25 We've received \$1,000 so far of the

1 \$3,000, and we are working with that company
2 that's out of Alabama, and we are expecting the
3 balance of that payment in -- any day now. That
4 will clear that up.

5 And again, that device has been -- is
6 not in use at this time. It's -- so I can answer
7 any additional questions about that if you have.

8 CHAIRMAN FOX: Is there anyone
9 here to represent K&S -- wait a minute. Is there
10 an issue here or are they -- they're going to take
11 care of this. So is this not an appeal?

12 MR. HARDY: It's not an
13 appeal. They were asked to appeal in a previous
14 board meeting, I think in December, and they were
15 a no-show. And we actually didn't have any
16 correspondence with them other than they would be
17 here to appeal, but they were not.

18 CHAIRMAN FOX: Okay. So --

19 MR. HARDY: And their appeal
20 opportunity is voided after that time.

21 MR. HERROD: This is just an
22 update just to keep you up to speed. So you don't
23 have to vote on anything.

24 CHAIRMAN FOX: This is good.

25 MR. HARDY: It's just an

1 update, yes, sir.

2 CHAIRMAN FOX: Okay.

3 MR. HARDY: Thank you.

4 CHAIRMAN FOX: Moving right
5 along, under New Business, Arnold Homes Long
6 Flats, a LULA Variance.

7 MR. HERROD: We have a
8 gentleman here who wants to talk to that.

9 CHAIRMAN FOX: Sir, when you
10 approach there, please give us your name, address,
11 and phone number.

12 MR. WOODSON: Yes, sir.

13 My name is Ken Woodson. I'm with
14 Access & Mobility. Our address is 4636 Lebanon
15 Pike in Hermitage, Tennessee. We're an elevator
16 installation company.

17 A couple of comments about this
18 request for a variance. This elevator is -- fits
19 the intended use for the limited use, limited
20 access. There's only about seven units in this
21 building that would even potentially use this
22 elevator. It's remotely located in a back
23 hallway, so it's not a primary entrance.

24 So we would consider the use of this
25 elevator for a variance to install. It's a little

1 bit taller than the code requires or allows, so
2 we're asking for a variance to install this
3 elevator.

4 CHAIRMAN FOX: Anything else?

5 MR. WOODSON: Any questions?

6 CHAIRMAN FOX: Any questions
7 from the Board?

8 MR. WOODSON: Appreciate it.

9 CHAIRMAN FOX: Is Mr. Steele
10 going to respond?

11 MR. STEELE: I can.

12 The request is for an additional
13 2 1/2 feet of rise for this elevator. These
14 elevators are specifically limited in their use
15 and application by speed, rise, and capacity, and
16 that rise is limited to 25 feet. So the 27 1/2 is
17 2 1/2 feet above what the code allows. I don't
18 feel like that's the intended use for that
19 product.

20 CHAIRMAN FOX: So there's no
21 underlying circumstances that would cause it to --

22 MR. STEELE: The code is very
23 specific. It says it shall not be taller -- or
24 greater than 25 foot of rise.

25 CHAIRMAN FOX: Any comments

1 from the Board?

2 MR. LaPORTE: One.

3 CHAIRMAN FOX: Please.

4 MR. LaPORTE: I just want to
5 make a clarification because I hear this a lot.
6 The LULA acronym, I believe you said it was
7 limited use, limited access. It is limited use,
8 limited application.

9 And agree with Mr. Steele. The
10 application is very clearly defined in the code,
11 and the application isn't regarding the building
12 type or the loading type or anything like that.
13 It is speed, capacity, rise, and square footage of
14 the platform. And it's very specific that the
15 application is limited to 25-foot maximum rise.

16 The code committee that writes these
17 codes, they're very specific for reasons, and that
18 is the application limit for this limited use,
19 limited application piece of equipment. So this
20 criteria definitely falls outside of those
21 parameters.

22 MR. HERROD: Mr. Chairman, the
23 remedy for this is to put in a commercial elevator
24 instead of a LULA. Costs a little bit more money,
25 but that is the remedy for this since the LULA

1 does not meet the requirement or the limitations
2 of a LULA device. So just so the Board knows what
3 can be done about that one.

4 CHAIRMAN FOX: Okay. So I
5 would entertain a motion from the Board to either
6 approve the variance or to deny the variance.

7 MS. O'CONNOR: I would move to
8 deny the variance.

9 CHAIRMAN FOX: I have a motion
10 to deny.

11 MR. HALE: Second.

12 CHAIRMAN FOX: We have a
13 second. Any discussion?

14 (No verbal response.)

15 CHAIRMAN FOX: Hearing none,
16 all in favor of the motion, let it be known by
17 saying, "aye."

18 (Affirmative response.)

19 CHAIRMAN FOX: All opposed,
20 like sign.

21 (No verbal response.)

22 CHAIRMAN FOX: Thank you.

23 Anything else on that, Mr. Herrod?

24 MR. HERROD: That's all.

25 CHAIRMAN FOX: Okay. Next

1 item is Open Discussion.

2 (No verbal response.)

3 CHAIRMAN FOX: Hearing none,
4 we will move along to the calendar, which the next
5 meeting would be September the 4th of 2024,
6 9:00 a.m. Central Daylight Time; and then the
7 second one would be December 3rd, 2024, Central
8 Standard Time, if needed.

9 Okay. Do I have a motion to adjourn?

10 MS. O'CONNOR: So moved.

11 CHAIRMAN FOX: We are out of
12 here. Thank you.
